Successive chapters address attendance and the instructional program, the education of children with special needs, employment and personnel, expression and associational rights, the role of religion in public schools, student discipline, open meetings and records, privacy, search and seizure, and legal liability under both federal and Texas law. In addition to state law, the book addresses the role of the federal government in school operation through such major federal legislation as the Americans with Disabilities Act, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. Statute and case references are kept as simple as possible, and a complete index of case citations is included for those readers who wish to consult the cases themselves. The appendices describe how case law is reported and where to find it, along with a glossary of legal terms and a listing of other sources on Texas school law.

Just how much freedom of speech should high school students have? In the final chapter on the 2007 *Bong Hits 4 Jesus* case, she asks what many people probably wondered: when the Supreme Court gave teenagers the right to wear black armbands in school to protest the Vietnam War, just how far does this right go? Did the Court also give students who just wanted to provoke their principal the right to post signs advocating drug use? Each chapter is full of insight into famous decisions and the inner workings of the courts. *Speaking Up* offers eye-opening history for students, teachers, lawyers, and parents seeking to understand how the law attempts to balance order and freedom in schools.

There were times of fear and worry, money shortage, casualties, and hardships of war, but there was serenity and love and the sharing of burdens and problems, but most of those who went through it all would gladly experience the time again. The struggles of Pocasset, Oklahoma, could be a challenge for any community, yet while history paints a bleak picture of times during the Depression and the Dust Bowl, Heaston reminds us how America's faithful survived and overcame life during the Depression, the Dust Bowl, and World War II—not to mention those frigid winters where the only source of heat was a small stove, which was far away from the icy cold blankets in the bedroom. In *A Paean to Pocasset* Frank E. Heaston remembers with longing what it was like to be young, launch fireworks, run barefoot, and learn hard work through a close-knit community and the family business. Life in a small town was anything but easy, yet it succeeded in producing vibrant, flourishing camaraderie for this small town. There were births and deaths, soldiers in war, and war efforts back home. The Depression was a way of life, and the Dust Bowl was just one more obstacle to overcome, making the community of Pocasset a stronger and more resilient town in the great history of America. Annual Report of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations Oxford University Press

This book offers a close-up look at theological education in the U.S. today. The authors' goal is to understand the way in which institutional culture affects the outcome of the educational process. To that end, they undertake ethnographic studies of two seminaries—one evangelical and one mainline Protestant. These studies, written in a lively journalistic style, make up the first part of the book and offer fascinating portraits of two very different intellectual, religious, and social worlds. The authors go on to analyze these disparate environments, and suggest how in each case corporate culture acts as an agent of educational change. They find two major consequences stemming from the culture of each school. First, each culture gives expression to a normative goal that aims at shaping the way students understand themselves and from issues of ministry practice. Second, each provides a "cultural tool kit" of knowledge, practices, and skills that students use to construct strategies of action for the various problems and issues that will confront them as pastors or in other forms of ministry. In the concluding chapters, the authors explore the implications of their findings for theories of institutional culture and professional socialization and for interpreting the state of religion in America. They identify some of the practical dilemmas that theological and other professional schools currently face, and reflect on how their findings might contribute to their solution. This accessible, thought-provoking study will not only illuminate the structure and process by which culture educates and forms, but also provide invaluable insights into important dynamics of American religious life.
